Over 1 billion people lack access to water Over 2.5 billion people lack access to sanitation

Dignity and Empowerment

Past approaches have treated Base of Pyramid communities as passive recipients of aid

Scale

Past approaches have not scaled to serve growing urban and peri-urban populations.

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
Issues Related to Creating Watsan Infrastructure

Dignity

- Communities not in control of the process goals
- Projects "for BoP" instead of "with BoP"

Scalability

- Insufficient and inefficient allocation of funds
- Poor execution and lack of learning from failures




Access Created: "Water Bonds" Market

Dignity & Scale

Builds the capacity of resources that already exist by changing incentives Creates financial and organizing tools for better oversight and process ownership

Government unsupportive of watsan marketplace	Engaging in active dialogue and leverage existing relationships	Government's reaction would lead to negative reputation – low chances of occurrence
